

Cinema Columbus Film Festival Announces 2023 Film Selections

Tickets on Sale Today

Presented by <u>CAPA</u>, the <u>Cinema Columbus Film Festival</u> today announced the roster of independent films selected for the 2023 festival and its screening schedule for April 26-30. Returning to a traditional, submission-based film festival, Cinema Columbus will partner with 10 different central Ohio venues including CAPA's Lincoln and Palace Theatres, the Drexel Theatre, the Gateway Film Center, Studio 35 Cinema & Drafthouse, the Wexner Center for the Arts, the Center of Science and Industry (COSI), Columbus College of Art & Design (CCAD), the Columbus Museum of Art, and the McConnell Art Center.

"I couldn't be prouder of the films and filmmakers who will be part of this year's Cinema Columbus Film Festival," shared festival coordinator Molly Kreuzman. "And I know our city will welcome them with open arms!"

The 2023 festival will open at the Lincoln Theatre with the 2022 documentary *Hargrove*, spotlighting the musical genius of jazz trumpet legend Roy Hargrove up close and personal during a summer European tour in what would be the last year of his life. Also featured are the world premieres of locally produced films *Duranguito* (directors: Dominique Martinez, Zane Abraham), and *MID WEST* (director: Aaron Massey). Debuting this year are several short film blocks including shorts from CineSpace, the New York International Children's Film Festival, Brooklyn-based filmmaker and artist Elisabeth Subrin, and more.

Opening night of the 2023 Cinema Columbus Film Festival is presented through the generous support of Donna and Larry James, <u>Green Blanket</u>, <u>Nationwide Children's Hospital</u>, and <u>White Castle</u>; with additional festival support from the <u>Ohio Arts Council</u>, the <u>AEP Foundation</u>, <u>Donatos Pizza</u>, <u>Land-Grant Brewing Company</u>, <u>Fechtor Advertising</u>, the <u>Columbus Rotary</u>, and <u>Music Columbus</u>; and media support from <u>Orange Barrel Media</u>, <u>The Columbus Dispatch</u>, <u>WCBE 90.5 FM</u>, and <u>WOSU Public Media</u>.

7 pm - *Hargrove* (2022)

Lincoln Theatre (769 E Long St.)

Genre: Documentary

Filmed in the jazz clubs of New York, Los Angeles, Paris, and across Mediterranean Europe on his unexpectedly final tour, *Hargrove* shines a bright spotlight on the genius of Roy Hargrove and his enormous contribution to the art of jazz. Key conversations expand beyond Roy's personal story and explore the terrain of what it means to be an artist in America. *Hargrove* dives into multidimensional perspectives on Black music while offering a glimpse into the politics of power and race in the music industry. Roy's narrative reverberates in today's Black Lives Matter movement with issues of ethics, exploitation, and empathy called into question. Told in vérité style, *Hargrove* interweaves themes of friendship, art, spirituality, and death with stellar live performances and intimate interviews. Music icons Erykah Badu, Herbie Hancock, Questlove, Sonny Rollins, Wynton Marsalis, and yasiin bey (Mos Def) reflect on Roy's indelible impact, giving him his place amongst the constellations.

Moviegoers are invited to attend a pre-screening performance at 6 pm with a roster of Columbus jazz all-stars featuring Bobby Floyd (keyboards), Miles Smith (trumpet), Cedric Easton (drums), Bryan Olsheski (saxophone), Halle Craig (bass), and Tia Ward (violin). There will be a post-screening, live panel discussion with the film's producer and director Eliane Henri, Dr. Ted McDaniel (professor of African American music at The Ohio State University), Dr. Jack Marchbanks (co-host of WCBE's Jazz Sunday), and other special guests, led by moderator and composer/drummer/educator Dr. Mark Lomax, II.

After a deceptive bond initiative passes in 2012, wealthy developers and city officials conspire to construct an arena within downtown El Paso's oldest neighborhood, all while its elderly residents, led by a 94-year-old Antonia Morales, combat the attempts at forced displacement and the complete destruction of their historic border community.

Rehabilitation centers, VR experiments, fervent prayers, voice notes, love making, and cemeteries are the record of a filmmaker's journey trying to amend the impossible: finding absolution for a broken family by making her father walk again.
